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Introduction


A transformation has begun in Downtown Jonesboro! From the extensive renovation of Lee Street Park in 2016 to the removal of blighted buildings making way for the new Broad Street Plaza commercial development, the momentum keeps building. The Blueprint Jonesboro plan created in 2017 has been actively spurring progress and the plan has been updated several times in recent years to account for new ideas and improvements. This progress is the result of many forces working together: visionary city leadership, an enterprising business community, a strong and hardworking network of local service providers, and residents who hold great pride in their community.

This Concept Plan glimpses the additional positive change that will come to Downtown Jonesboro through a full community transformation planning effort that coordinates delivery of enhanced services to neighborhood residents. It provides both a foundation upon which a more comprehensive future planning effort will be based as well as a springboard to advance the community's plans. A Community Transformation Plan describes a process by which neighborhood-level change can be initiated through the coordinated work of community partners to improve the availability of health, education, employment, and transportation services. The Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) recognizes the promise of such efforts to encourage holistic strategies that increase the resources and opportunities available to the residents in communities where new investment in affordable housing is contemplated. Plans such as this are instrumental in ensuring existing residents, as well as new residents who may relocate to a neighborhood as a result of future affordable housing development, have access to the services they need to thrive.

Study Area

The Defined Neighborhood for this plan is the Blueprint Jonesboro study area, which consists of Jonesboro's downtown area, including Main Street/ Jonesboro Road and the surrounding neighborhood (see Figure 1). This Defined Neighborhood includes the proposed Hearthside Jonesboro site but does not encompass the entire City of Jonesboro; it is congruent with the targeted area of the Blueprint Jonesboro Livable Centers Initiative Study (2017) and the study's 2020 update.

Planning Context

The Community Transformation Plan will build upon extensive planning efforts previously completed for the City of Jonesboro. These plans include the 2003 Livable Centers Initiative, the 2015 Jonesboro Comprehensive Plan, and the 2017 Blueprint Jonesboro Plan, which was amended in 2019 and 2020 to reflect changes in the city's vision. These plans lay important groundwork for the Community Transformation Plan. Each plan adopts a target area that overlaps the Defined Neighborhood in this plan, calls for affordable housing and has resulted in concrete actions taken within the last year.

2003 LIVABLE CENTERS INITIATIVE

The 2003 Jonesboro Livable Centers Initiative was designed to help the city build upon its historic character and develop a vision for its future development. Place-based goals cited in the 2003 LCI include diverse housing, diverse travel modes, increased investment in town centers, and historic preservation.

The 2003 plan utilized several methods for public engagement: a kickoff meeting, monthly stakeholder meetings, a business leader luncheon, a design workshop, bus tour and open house.

2015 JONESBORO COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Comprehensive Plan is Jonesboro's city-wide planning document, which guides future activities such as transportation, environmental management, land use, housing, and recreation. The 2035 goals listed in the Comprehensive Plan include: (1) a bustling main street district, (2) remarkable places throughout the city, (3) a strong economy, and (4) a connected city with high quality amenities. The plan calls for traditional neighborhoods that use traditional design principles and have both vehicular and pedestrian/bike connectivity.

As a plan update, the public engagement activities included three meetings of the plan's steering committee and an open house for the public.

BLUEPRINT JONESBORO

As a continuation of the 2003 LCI Study, Blueprint Jonesboro maintains the LCI's earlier vision to build upon the city's historic character and develop a vision for future development. The outlined goals of the Blueprint Jonesboro Plan include: providing housing opportunities downtown, encouraging mixed use developments, increasing Jonesboro's sense of place and community identity, increasing pedestrian

connections and safety, reducing demand for vehicular trips, planning for future transit and commuter rail and parking, and promotion of the city's existing assets.

The public engagement process for the Blueprint Jonesboro Plan was similarly robust to public engagement for the LCI study. Public engagement included one-on-one interviews with local stakeholders, a public visioning workshop, an online survey and an image survey. The study also involved ongoing open dialogue with local business and property owners.

The Community-Based Team

The Community-Based Team, comprised of Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity (as the Community-Based Developer) and the Community Quarterback Board will undertake community engagement and outreach in order to create a Community Transformation Plan targeting the Defined Neighborhood. The members of the Community-Based Team together hold deep institutional knowledge of Jonesboro and many lead organizations controlling significant resources than can be brought to bear on the needs and challenges identified in Downtown Jonesboro.

The Community-Based Team has already commenced meeting together, having held its first meeting on June 10, 2020. The meeting, conducted remotely via conference call due to social distancing and public health precautions, was attended by every team member and the conversation reflected their enthusiasm for the planning work that lies ahead.

Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity (SCHFH) is a member of the Hearthside Jonesboro Project Team and will fill the role of Community-Based Developer. Part of SCHFH's responsibilities related to its role will be to establish and maintain a \$50,000 Community Improvement Fund. While SCHFH will provide oversight and accounting for the Community Improvement Fund, the Community Quarterback Board will direct the use of the funds toward meeting gaps and challenges identified in the Community Transformation Plan.

The 9-member Community Quarterback Board is chaired by the Jonesboro City Manager. Of the nine members, five represent required sectors or categories outlined in Georgia DCA's Qualified Allocation Plan (education, healthcare, transportation, and two local government representatives). Three members (one-third of the CQB) are low-income representatives, and the final seat is held by a nonprofit executive with a long history of community advocacy in Jonesboro.

Community Based Developer: Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity

Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity is a nonprofit housing organization with a 34-year history serving Jonesboro and surrounding areas and is a certified CHDO for Clayton County. The organization's primary functions are to build affordable homes, rehabilitate homes, and repair homes for low income working families. Through homeowner education SCHFH prepares families for the life changing experience of homeownership. Through new home construction SCHFH partners with financial sponsors and hundreds of volunteers to build attractive, affordable and energy efficient homes.

Southern Crescent's housing rehabilitation program transforms foreclosed and vacant properties from eyesores to success stories and its critical home repair program helps existing homeowners improve their quality of live and save money on energy bills. Since 1986, SCHFH has successfully built 205 new homes and conducted more than 180 home repairs serving a combined total of 350 families.

Tying all this important work together, SCHFH has also instituted a Neighborhood Revitalization Program that works beyond any one Habitat home or homeowner to bring positive change to an entire community. SCHFH's holistic revitalization approach begins with a set of unique goals determined by neighborhood residents. Habitat then works in collaboration with its many community partners to coordinate an array of resources to meet the needs within the community. These may include resident engagement,

community upkeep, traffic and safety improvements, youth engagement, and parks/gardens. As a result, SCHFH's work leaves behind not just new homes and proud homeowners, but strong and vibrant communities that preserve and extend the organization's investment.

SCHFH'S COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity's partnerships throughout its service area reveal the organization's commitment to the community and its ability to work collaboratively to improve and revitalize neighborhoods in its service area. Within Clayton County, SCHFH's current partners include Jonesboro United Methodist Church, which has provided regular volunteers for over 20 years through its Habitat for Humanity Ministry; Nothing But The Truth, an organization that provides non-perishable food packages for children in need; and Metro Youth Ministries, which trains youth aged 16 to 20 in construction skills and provides youth with work experience through Habitat construction projects. SCHFH has been a Clayton County CDBG grant recipient for approximately 15 years, which has enabled the SCHFH to build four new subdivisions within the county. Lastly, SCHFH's 2019 partnership with the United Way of Greater Atlanta, Clayton County, the Clayton County School System and Heart to Nourish Hope, plans to address housing instability in Clayton County and its effects on student learning.

Listed in the table below are details of five of SCHFH's key partnerships, all of which are supported by letters in this plan's appendix.

In other parts of its service area, SCHFH has also developed effective, ongoing partnerships. One of SCHFH's strongest partnerships is with Fayette Senior Services, where SCHFH offers grant funded, home repair services to seniors that need accessibility features or other home repairs. The SCHFH also regularly receives volunteers from Piedmont Fayette Hospital, as well as fund from the Home Depot Foundation to provide home repair and new construction for veterans.

For educational resources, the SCHFH also maintains partnerships outside of its service area. A primary example is SCHFH's partnership with Metro Fair Housing, a regional fair housing organization, where clients are offered an exchange of homebuyers' classes between the two organizations.

SCHFH'S PHILANTHROPY

Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity also demonstrates its investment in its service area through its philanthropic activities. Within Clayton County, the SCHFH completed home repair and new home construction in the Trinity Park neighborhood in 2017. SCHFH helped provide neighborhood safety programs and establish a community garden. The SCHFH also provided referrals to community resources such as food banks, GED, and job fairs. Also in 2017, the SCHFH donated supplies for the construction of Gigi's House, a shelter for victims of sex trafficking. SCHFH pledged to establish a teen financial class for the girls at Gigi's House. The SCHFH also remodeled the bathroom and made other handicapped accessible modifications at the home of Chase Maddox, a Locust Grove police officer killed in the line of duty in 2018. The SCHFH regularly supports a collegiate chapter of Habitat at Clayton State University, where they conduct builds of benches, picnic tables, arbors and flower beds for the campus.

In neighboring Fayette County, the SCHFH donated \$25,000 to build a bathroom for an elderly man who had been using an outhouse. The renovation project also included kitchen plumbing, electrical wiring throughout the house, and the installation of a septic tank. The SCHFH also volunteered services to renovate Church Street Park in Fayette County by repairing the park's pavilion and installing a fence around the park.

Specific examples of SCHFH's philanthropic activities that are further documented in this plan's appendix include:

- Prayor Project: SCHFH donated \$25,000 to add a bathroom to the home of a Fayette County resident who had been using an outhouse for 81 years. With partnerships, SCHFH built a bathroom, added plumbing to the kitchen, upgraded the whole-house electrical, and installed a septic tank.
- Maddox Project: SCHFH remodeled the bathroom and made other handicapped-accessible modifications for the family of fallen Locust Grove Police Officer who was killed in the line of

- duty in 2018. The officer left a pregnant wife and a wheelchair-bound son. SCHFH partnered with Home Depot to provide a ramp, widened doorways and improved the bathroom.
- Clayton State University Collegiate Chapter: SCHFH builds on campus with annually with Clayton State University students. In 2019, SCHFH built benches in the campus common area and in past years has built picnic tables, arbors and flower beds.

Other philanthropic activities by the SCHFH include the organization's mortgage down payment assistance to families, which totals \$60,000 per year. The SCHFH also hosts an Americorps*VISTA volunteer at its office that conducts free tax preparation for low income families.

COMMUNITY-BASED DEVELOPER ROLE

SCHFH is a mission-focused organization that understands well the value of partnerships to complement its investments in families and housing within the community. Known locally as a "bridge-builder", SCHFH strengthens connections between government, business, churches, civic groups, schools and individuals who want to join together in making a difference. This reputation is evident in SCHFH's commitment to serve as a Community-Based Developer on Hearthside Jonesboro's Community-Based Team. In this role, Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity will:

- Work with the Community Quarterback Board to help shape the Community Transformation Plan's goals and coordinate its implementation in the Defined Neighborhood.
- Participate in Community Quarterback Board meetings and attend its community engagement meetings to ensure successful planning and coordination of activities and projects in the Defined Neighborhood.
- Establish a \$50,000 Community Improvement Fund to be controlled by the Community Quarterback Board for the implementation of activities responsive to goals identified in the Community Transformation Plan.

Community Quarterback Board

A Community Quarterback Board (CQB) is a coalition of public and private entities serving the Defined Neighborhood that reflects the local partnerships among residents, stakeholders, and organizations that will together drive community engagement and support planning around community transformation. In short, the CQB is a diverse and representative steering committee that will lead the process of creating a Community Transformation Plan and work to ensure that the plans goals are met. Jonesboro's CQB meets every aspect of these ideals: it is a group of true community leaders with a history of partnership and collaborative work in Jonesboro.

The inaugural meeting of the Community Quarterback Board was held on June 10, 2020 by conference call. An agenda and call log from that first meeting are included in the appendix. At the CQB's initial meeting, members each shared their great enthusiasm for the transformation planning effort and also their excitement over positive changes they've already observed in downtown Jonesboro – from new restaurants opening to the embrace of Arts Clayton, to the significant renovation to downtown's Lee Street Park.

In addition to the CQB meeting, each member of the CQB was individually interviewed by members of the planning team in order to gather information about their roles ad partnerships in the community and to gauge needs in the community in the areas of health, education, employment, and transportation services. Input from CQB members as well as data collected through a preliminary community survey is detailed in the following section of this plan. Each individual member of the CQB is profiled below.

RICKY L. CLARK, JR. (CQB CHAIR, LOCAL GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVE)

City Manager City of Jonesboro

Mr. Clark serves as the City Manager for the City of Jonesboro and the Community Quarterback Board Chairperson. Mr. Clark was appointed as Jonesboro's City Manager in 2016 and has worked to revitalize downtown Jonesboro and foster the city's business-friendly atmosphere. Mr. Clark serves on the Development Authority of Clayton County, the Jonesboro Downtown Development Authority, as well as the Jonesboro Main Street advisory board.

RANDY DANIEL

Lifelong Resident City of Jonesboro

Mr. Daniel is a lifelong Jonesboro resident and former barber. While less active in recent years due to health concerns, Mr. Daniel expresses an interest in the improvement of the City of Jonesboro. He is very knowledgeable about local activities in the Defined Neighborhood, including activities at Lee Street Park and the First Baptist Church of Jonesboro's Recreation Outreach Center.

DR. DOUG HENDRIX (EDUCATION REPRESENTATIVE)

Assistant Superintendent Clayton County Schools

Dr. Doug Hendrix has served the Clayton County School District as a teacher, a coach, an assistant principal, a district administrator, district executive, and is currently the Assistant Superintendent. In this role, Dr. Hendrix is responsible for direct oversight of 18 different schools, including all schools in the Jonesboro area. These include Lee Street Elementary which is in the plan's Defined Neighborhood, as well as Jonesboro Middle and Jonesboro High School. Although not currently a resident of Jonesboro, Dr. Hendrix previously lived in Clayton County for 20 years, having participated in Leadership Clayton, the Jonesboro/Stockbridge Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., and the Atlanta Chapter of the Fort Valley State Alumni Association.

SHARON MCDONALD, RN (HEALTH SERVICES REPRESENTATIVE)

Director of Business Development Southern Regional Medical Center

Ms. McDonald is a registered nurse and the Director of Business Development at Southern Regional Medical Center in Riverdale, GA. In her capacity, Ms. McDonald advocates for the Southern Regional Medical Center's NICHE program (Nurses Improving Care for Health System Elders), which offers evidence-based best practices in geriatric nursing. Her participation on the board will improve access to these services for senior residents at Hearthside Jonesboro.

DAWN MURRAY

Founder & CEO House of Dawn

For over 20 years, Ms. Murray has been active in the Jonesboro community, serving as a member of Rotary, and on the boards of CASA and the Jonesboro Downtown Development Authority. As the founder and CEO of House of Dawn, Ms. Murray is keenly aware of the needs of low-income residents of Jonesboro, particularly young mothers and their children. Through House of Dawn, Ms. Murray seeks to provide a stable, loving, home for young mothers and their children under adult supervision and to provide young mothers with the educational opportunities and the life training skills that they will need to become independent, self-supporting women.

KATIE KIRKLAND

Resident

City of Jonesboro

Ms. Kirkland has been a Jonesboro resident for over 40 years. During her career, Ms. Kirkland worked as a health professional at the Southern Regional Medical Center. Now, as an active retiree, Ms. Kirkland volunteers her time with the city whenever called upon.

VICKI SMITH Lifelong Resident City of Jonesboro

Ms. Smith is a lifelong Jonesboro resident. Her mother, Katherine Smith, worked for the City of Jonesboro for 48 years, including service as the city clerk. Through her mother's long-term service to the city, Ms. Smith also became involved and knowledgeable about Jonesboro's ongoing projects. Although she has limited mobility due to a disability, Ms. Smith remains active and is eager to serve on the board.

TORI STRAWTER-TANKS (Transportation Services Representative)

Director

Clayton County Senior Services

Mrs. Strawter-Tanks is the Director of Senior Services for Clayton County. She proudly serves as the director over Georgia's only nationally accredited senior centers, geared toward the active senior. Her department offers a senior transportation program that serves over 300 seniors traveling to and from the senior centers and medical appointments. Lastly, her department serves homebound seniors with meals and home care services. Mrs. Strawter-Tanks has served with Clayton County Senior Services since 2006.

ED WISE (LOCAL GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVE)

Councilman

City of Jonesboro

Councilman Ed Wise has been a resident of Jonesboro for nearly 2 decades and serves on the Jonesboro City Council. He is a long-time advocate for public safety and has even served the City of Jonesboro as a volunteer firefighter. Councilman Wise operates a local business called Sirens for Cities, which produces severe weather detection equipment. He is excited about the forward movement of the city and is eager to serve on this board.

Plan Funding & Implementation

Operation of the Transformation Plan

With leadership from both Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity as the Community-Based Developer and Jonesboro's City Manager, Mr. Ricky L. Clark, Jr. as the chair of the Community Quarterback Board, the Community-Based Team will, together, take on issues and activities focused around education, healthcare, transportation and employment while SCHFH's unique perspective will also bring an added dimension by focusing on new construction of homes, home repair, and neighborhood revitalization.

SCHFH is a consulting co-developer of Hearthside Jonesboro and receives 15% of the project team's developer fee. These funds will, in turn, then be used to establish a \$50,000 Community Improvement Fund with the balance going toward SCHFH's construction and other activities within the Defined Neighborhood. These activities will include home construction, home repair and neighborhood revitalization projects, all within the Downtown Jonesboro Defined Neighborhood. SCHFH's Neighborhood Revitalization Program is particularly suited to bring significant transformational impact to Downtown Jonesboro as it embraces a holistic approach based on a set of goals determined at the grassroots level with neighborhood residents. Habitat works in collaboration with its many community partners to coordinate an array of resources to meet the unique needs within the community. These may include resident engagement, community upkeep, traffic and safety improvements, youth engagement, and parks/gardens.

The Hearthside Jonesboro development will both catalyze and support the CQB's work in important ways. As build-out is completed, Hearthside's community facilities will host meetings of the CQB and public meetings that will be scheduled as part of the full community transformation plan's development. Other activities that may be conducted in response to needs identified by the plan (e.g. health fairs, classes, seminars, etc.) can also be hosted free-of-charge at Hearthside. OneStreet Residential further expects that Hearthside residents will be active and engaged members of the Downtown Jonesboro community and would look forward to volunteer opportunities with members of the CQB and other community partners.

Community Improvement Fund

Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity has pledged \$50,000 of its share of the developer fee to create a Community Improvement Fund that will support the work of the city's CQB, as well as community revitalization activities conducted in the Defined Neighborhood by SCHFH, such as new home construction and home repair. Establishment of the Community Improvement Fund will allow the Community-Based Team to increase fund programs and activities needed to meet education, health, employment, and transportation needs identified in the Defined Neighborhood. It is expected that the active seniors residing at Hearthside Jonesboro will benefit from the fund as well as residents of the wider Downtown Jonesboro Defined Neighborhood.

While SCHFH is capitalizing the Community Improvement Fund, the funds will be held by and deposited into an account designated by the City of Jonesboro to ensure transparent accounting and oversight. Use

of the funds will be directed by the Community Quarterback Board and may be used for activities in the Defined Neighborhood such as:

- Ongoing transformation planning and community research
- Community outreach and engagement in the form of public meetings, resident questionnaires and surveys, community organizing, and other community-building events
- Implementation for small neighborhood revitalization activities in the areas of education, access to health care, transportation, and employment
- Seed money to attract and match grants from non-profits and other organizations working in the education, health care, transportation, and employment sectors
- Volunteer recruitment initiatives and events

SCHFH's creation of a Community Improvement Fund is an important and necessary commitment that pairs significant financial resources with the goals derived from the Community Transformation Plan. This ensures the CQB will be able to work actively toward implementation of the plan's goals once they are established.

DCA Resources Leveraged

The Hearthside Jonesboro proposal and the Downtown Jonesboro Community Transformation Plan will both leverage other current investments made by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs in the Defined Neighborhood. These other investments include:

- Rural Zone Tax Credit Program: To reinforce downtown Jonesboro with the addition of a
 purposeful outdoor civic space that can serve as a "destination", the City has been working to
 acquire and demolish blighted structures along a section of Broad Street to provide linear green
 space enhanced through the burying of utilities along the corridor. This project is made possible
 through DCA's Rural Zone Tax Credit program which provides a \$2,000 tax credit tied to the
 creation of retail and professional service jobs.
- Main Street Program: The City of Jonesboro participates in DCA's Classic Main Street Program, a
 key driver of downtown commercial district revitalizations throughout the state. As a participant
 in the program, Jonesboro is required to meet a set of accreditation standards imposed by the
 National Main Street Center that emphasize education around historic preservation and
 economic development.
- Downtown Development Revolving Loan Fund: The City of Jonesboro is preparing an application
 for \$250,000 from DCA's Downtown Development Revolving Loan Fund (DD RLF) to support
 additional improvements in and around the Broad Street Plaza redevelopment project. Using the
 DD RLF program, cities are able to obtain below-market rate financing for projects that will


Population and Growth









Percent of Households with Income \$24,000 and Below






Tenure of Occupied Housing Units









Key Community Assets

Downtown Jonesboro's Defined Neighborhood has benefited from years of thoughtful investment by the City of Jonesboro. In an effort to rebuild its downtown, Jonesboro has implemented several improvements in the defined neighborhood, including major renovations to Lee Street Park in 2016, and the demolition of blighted buildings on Broad Street for an upcoming outdoor commercial development called Broad Street Plaza. The city's Arts and Entertainment District Overlay is also located in this neighborhood, and focuses on incorporating murals, art galleries and events into the fabric of everyday life. Despite its ongoing growth, this neighborhood continues to support a variety of services and resources for residents, including educational opportunities, health and wellness activities, and recreation.

Listed below are several important community assets located within the Defined Neighborhood.

ARTS CLAYTON GALLERY

136 S. Main Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Arts Clayton Gallery is a public art gallery which also offers art classes for children and adults. The gallery's on-site educational services include workshops and summer camps.

CLAYTON COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM - JONESBORO BRANCH

124 Smith Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Jonesboro branch of the Clayton County Public Library System offers educational programming and events for all ages. The library also provides free internet access to county residents with a library card.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF JONESBORO ROC

148 Church Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Recreation Outreach Center (ROC) is a ministry of the First Baptist Church of Jonesboro. The ROC offers free membership to its gymnasium, exercise classes and basketball league.

JONESBORO UNITED METHODIST PRESCHOOL AND PRIMARY (JUMPP) SCHOOL

142 S. Main Street

Jonesboro, GA 30236

The JUMPP school offers academic curricula, as well as religious instruction, for children aged 1-7.

LEE STREET ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

178 Lee Street

Jonesboro, GA 30236

In addition to providing public K-5 education during the school year, Lee Street Elementary is also one of Clayton County Public Schools' Summer Meal Program sites. The program offers free "grab and go"

meals for children aged 18 and under as well as individuals with state-defined mental or physical disabilities.

LEE STREET PARK AND AMPHITHEATER

155 Lee Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

Lee Street Park is home to Jonesboro's free outdoor concerts, festivals, and events. During the summer, the park also hosts a farmer's market. Lee Street Park has been a staple in Jonesboro for several decades. In 2016, the park reopened to the public after major renovations that included an amphitheater, pavilions, a playground, a walking track, park benches and landscaping.

MASSENGALE CITY PARK

937 Hanes Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

Located within the same city block as Jonesboro City Hall, Massengale City Park contains recreational amenities such as a playground, picnic pavilion, and walking track.

PERRY LEARNING CENTER

137 Spring Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Perry Learning Center is an open campus public high school that provides an opportunity for students to complete their high school curriculum outside of the traditional educational setting. The center serves youth 16 and older. Additional educational services include ESL (English as a Second Language) courses.

PREGNANCY CARE CENTER

158 S. Main Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Pregnancy Care Center offers religious pre-natal classes and guidance, free pregnancy tests and maternity clothing.

THE SALVATION ARMY

130 Spring Street Jonesboro, GA 30236

The Salvation Army Jonesboro Corps offers several services to low-income families, including a food pantry, youth programs, religious services and a men's club. The Salvation Army also offers financial emergency services, including assistance with rents, mortgages, utilities and prescriptions by appointment.




Figure 2: Community Resources in the Defined Neighborhood

Through its "Active Senior District Overlay District," shown in the map above, the City of Jonesboro looks to build affordable senior housing that allows residents to "age in place" with multimodal access to a variety of amenities in the city's core. The proposed Hearthside Jonesboro development will be located within this overlay on North Avenue, a central connecting street through Jonesboro. MARTA Route 193 provides public transit access from downtown Jonesboro to other locations, including Clayton State University, Forest Park and East Point. Due to its proximity to a MARTA route, the site also has access to MARTA Mobility, a shared ride, paratransit service for persons with disabilities.

In addition to transit and vehicular access, the proposed site is ideally located for short-distance walks to surrounding amenities. Within ¼ mile to the north of the site, there are several public amenities including Jonesboro City Hall, the United States Post Office, and a fire station. There is also a small, neighborhood park, Massengale City Park, which offers a walking track and other family-oriented amenities such as a playground and picnic pavilion.

Within a 10-minute walk south, residents of Hearthside Jonesboro will be able to access a variety of cultural, educational and recreational resources. Lee Street Park, which draws many visitors with its free outdoor concerts, festivals, farmer's market and events, is only a short walk from the site. Other amenities

to the south include the Perry Learning Center, Arts Clayton Gallery, the Jonesboro Library, the Road to Tara Museum, and First Baptist Church of Jonesboro's Recreation Outreach Center (ROC). Lastly, Hearthside Jonesboro will be connected to the "spine" of Jonesboro – Main Street. Here, residents will have access to the city's quaint commercial corridor with its local eateries and businesses. Hearthside Jonesboro will also include on-site amenities for residents, such as a community garden.

Preliminary Assessment of Community Needs and Challenges

Goals of the Community Transformation Plan include addressing education, health, employment, and transportation needs in the study area. For this Concept Plan, a preliminary assessment was made of community needs in the areas of education, health, employment, and transportation through a community survey and in-depth individual interviews with the residents and stakeholders making up the Community Quarterback Board. As this Concept Plan is later developed into a full Community Transformation Plan, a more robust process will be deployed for engaging the public, but the preliminary assessment detailed here provides an initial look at specific gaps within the key education, health, employment, and transportation areas for further study and evaluation.



volunteers fill the Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity conference room to pack "Weekend Food Bags" for Clayton County students to take home in their backpacks. The "Weekend Food Bags" are given to children that school counselors identified as being "food insecure" and in need of additional food for the weekend. The bags typically contain easy-open/self-serve items sourced from Midwest Food Bank in Peachtree City, as well as donations from the local community.



"Some of these students do not get to experience the simple things that we take for granted...like going in the pantry and knowing that there is something to eat. We often associate hunger with third world countries, but it is happening right in our own backyards," exclaimed Diane Soroko, the Nothing but the Truth Clayton County Program Coordinator.

The "Weekend Food" Ministry started in Gwinnett County over 10 years ago and branched out the Clayton County about 5 years ago. There are currently six schools and over 190 students that receive weekend food bags in Clayton County Schools.

It was a festive atmosphere recently at the south Fayette County home of life-long resident Walter Prayor, the recipient of a new bathroom and other home upgrades through the assistance of Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity (SCHFH).

According to a release from the Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity, Bradin has cerebral palsy, and his movement is very limited.


Last February, Maddox lost his life when assisting Henry County Sheriff's deputies with a warrant. Maddox was only 26 years old.

"In the midst of this tragedy, we hoped that in some meaningful way we could help the family," said Cynthia Jenkins, CEO of Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity, in a press release. "Gratefully, Team Depot has stepped in to fund a portion of the project to make this home barrier-free for Bradin. We hope to receive additional funds to complete the needed accessible ramps, bathroom modifications, and chairlift. We serve veteran-families and seniors who need these kinds of home repair every day. We know that the community will help us meet the needs of this family and others in South Metro Atlanta."

Team Depot, the associate-led volunteer program of The Home Depot, contributed around \$10,000 worth of gift cards to jumpstart the project, as well as another \$10,000 from The Home Depot Foundation.

Employees from various Home Depot stores in the area will join Southern Crescent staff and other volunteers on the morning of March 15 at the Maddox residence in Griffin.



Please accept this as a formal commitment of the financing we have previously discussed, for Hearthside Jonesboro's funding for the City's Community Transformation Plan.

An affiliate of One Street will be the General Partner for Hearthside Jonesboro Redevelopment, LP. That will own Hearthside Jonesboro and has executed a Development Services Agreement with Southern Crescent Habitat for Humanity (SCHFH), under which they will be our Community-Based Developer partner and earn a 15% share of the project's Developer Fee. Per the terms of that Agreement SCHFH will contribute \$50,000 of their Developer Fee to establish a Community Improvement Fund for the City's Community Transformation Plan.

Per our discussions, that Community Improvement Fund would be managed by the Transformation Plan's Community Quarterback Board and deposited in an account controlled by the City of Jonesboro, as Chair of that Board. We anticipate SCHFH's contributions to parallel the schedule of funding for the project's overall Developer Fee. Accordingly, we project approximately \$12,500 will be funded at Hearthside Jonesboro's construction closing (anticipated in August 2021). Future contributions will be made at construction completion, completion of the property's lease-up, with small additional payments made over the following 3 to 4 years of the property's operation.

The Community Transformation Concept Plan envisions planning, research and community engagement as uses of the Fund. So, SCHFH's initial Fund contribution will enable those activities to start in late 2021, in time to finalize the Plan before Hearthside Jonesboro's construction is completed.

- Seed money to attract and match grants from non-profits and other organizations working in the education, health care, transportation, and employment sectors
- Volunteer recruitment initiatives and events
